A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the seventh leading cause of death by disease in the United States, diabetes affects 29.1 million Americans, or 9.3 percent of the population; there is no known cure for this serious disease; and

WHEREAS, 8.1 million, or 27.8 percent, of those living with diabetes in the United States remain undiagnosed; without treatment, diabetes can cause damage to the heart, eyes, kidneys, and limbs; and

WHEREAS, another 86 million Americans have prediabetes, a serious health condition that often leads to Type 2 diabetes; if current trends continue, 1 in 3 adults in the United States will have diabetes by 2050; and

WHEREAS, Type 1 diabetes (T1D) is an autoimmune disease in which a person's pancreas stops producing insulin, a hormone that enables people to get energy from food; the body's immune system attacks and destroys the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas, called beta cells; and

WHEREAS, the onset of T1D is unrelated to diet or lifestyle, and there is no known prevention or cure; while the cause is not entirely understood, scientists believe environmental and genetic factors are involved; and

WHEREAS, T1D can occur suddenly, and affects children and adults of any age; those with T1D are dependent on injected or pumped insulin for life, and remain vulnerable to devastating complications; and

WHEREAS, of the 1.25 million Americans living with T1D, 200,000 are less than 20 years old; the prevalence of T1D in people under age 20 increased by 21 percent between 2001 and 2009; and

WHEREAS, 40,000 Americans are diagnosed with T1D each year, and 5 million—including nearly 600,000 youths—are expected to have the disease by 2050; the annual cost of T1D-associated health care is over \$14 billion in the United States; and

WHEREAS, diabetes has many faces, affecting men and women of all ages, races, ethnicities, and backgrounds; minority populations in the United States are at a higher risk for developing the disease; and

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina encourages citizens to increase awareness of the risk factors and symptoms related to diabetes; with access to information and support, those affected by diabetes in our communities are more likely to find treatment, before suffering the devastating complications of this disease;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ROY COOPER, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim November, 2017, as "DIABETES AWARENESS MONTH" in North Carolina, and commend its observance to all citizens.
