A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy (RSD), also known as Complex Regional Pain Syndrome (CRPS), is a rare disorder of the autonomic nervous system that is characterized by chronic, severe pain; and

WHEREAS, this debilitating and progressively chronic condition is characterized by intense burning pain, pathological changes in bone and skin, tissue swelling, and extreme sensitivity to touch; and

WHEREAS, there is no known cure for RSD/CRPS, and the disorder affects women, men, and children of all ethnicities, many of whom go undiagnosed; and

WHEREAS, frequently, RSD/CRPS is misdiagnosed as a painful nerve injury; the exact cause of the condition is not fully understood, but it may be associated with injury to the nerves, trauma, surgery, infection, cardiovascular disease, or radiation therapy; and

WHEREAS, RSD/CRPS can cause long-term disability; patients with this disorder live in extreme pain and experience severe muscle spasms, widespread body pain, fatigue, insomnia, weakness, swelling, short-term memory loss, and concentration difficulties; and

WHEREAS, although no standard treatment of RSD/CRPS has been developed, prevention and early treatment of symptoms are recommended; in most cases, the earlier treatment begins, the more effective it is likely to be; and

WHEREAS, Color the World Orange is an annual event held the first Monday of November to spread awareness of RSD/CRPS; on November 6, 2017, State of North Carolina joins the RSD/CRPS community as they come together to garner support and spread global awareness;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ROY COOPER, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim November, 2017, as "RSD/CRPS AWARENESS MONTH" and November 6, 2017, as "COLOR THE WORLD ORANGE DAY" in North Carolina, and commend observance to all citizens.
