## BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA

## A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, health care information technology and management systems are essential tools for improving the quality of patient care, ensuring patient safety, helping to coordinate care across health care settings, and reducing health care costs; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that implementing standards for interoperability and exchange of health information could save the United States approximately \$75 billion in health care expenses each year; and

WHEREAS, the ability to exchange health information confidently and securely across health care systems is fundamental to transforming America's health care delivery system, improving quality and clinical outcomes, and controlling costs; and

WHEREAS, the United States has prioritized adopting interoperable electronic health records (EHRs) and health information exchange (HIE) as essential components of the Medicare and Medicaid EHR Incentive Program's Meaningful Use Stage 2; and

WHEREAS, health information technology is the key to improving the quality and safety of health care delivery in our country; and

WHEREAS, since 2006, American organizations and companies have united to support National Health Information Technology Week to improve public awareness of the benefits of health information technology, including improved quality and cost efficiency of the health care system; and

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina recognizes the value of information technology and management systems in transforming health care for the people of the United States, and encourages interested parties to use this week to promote safe and secure interoperability and health information exchange;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ROY COOPER, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim October 2 - 6, 2017, as "HEALTH INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY WEEK" in North Carolina, and commend its observance to all citizens.
