A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, too many individuals – regardless of age, ability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, race, or circumstance – face the pain and fear of domestic violence; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Violence Against Women Survey, approximately 1.3 million women and 835,000 men are physically assaulted by an intimate partner in the United States every year; and

WHEREAS, overall, 3 in 10 women and 1 in 10 men in our country have experienced rape, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner, and reported at least one impact related to these or other forms of violent behavior in their relationship; and

WHEREAS, the impacts on victims who experience domestic violence include fear and concern for safety; post-traumatic stress symptoms; inability to attend school or work; injury; the need for housing, victim's advocacy, and legal services; emotional trauma; and, in some cases, permanent disability or death; and

WHEREAS, 80 percent of female victims of rape experienced their first sexual assault before the age of 25 and, within this group, 42 percent before the age of 18; more than 25 percent of male victims of rape experienced their first sexual assault when they were 10 years of age or younger; and

WHEREAS, a great deal of domestic violence incidents go unreported by survivors who experience fear of repercussions, threats of future violence, denial, guilt, shame, feelings of worthlessness, and/or fear of negative response; in North Carolina, many cities and counties are not required to accurately report acts of domestic violence; and

WHEREAS, during National Domestic Violence Awareness month, we shine a light on this violation of the basic human right to be free from violence and abuse, pledging to ensure every victim of domestic violence knows they are not alone; and

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina encourages citizens to raise awareness of the prevalence of domestic abuse; foster supportive communities where all people feel safe in all aspects of their lives; and help survivors recover, heal, seek justice, and thrive;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ROY COOPER, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim October, 2017, as "DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH" in North Carolina, and commend its observance to all citizens.
