A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the origin of gospel music can be traced to black oral traditions in the early 17th century, drawing upon the syncopated rhythms and call and response form of African American spirituals; and

WHEREAS, the term gospel is used to describe a variety of different music styles of praise and worship; the African American gospel tradition found in eastern and Piedmont North Carolina emerged around the turn of the 20th century, alongside ragtime, jazz, and blues; and

WHEREAS, gospel music has been an important source of cultural connection and upbringing for countless individuals and families across North Carolina, filling churches, homes, and radios with songs of faith; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina has been home to many nationally known gospel artists such as the Reverend Faircloth C. Barnes, his son, Luther Barnes, the Anointed Jackson Sisters, the Reverend Malkarska Williams and the Williams Family; and

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina is proud to honor the long history of gospel music in our state, and the significant impact it has had on our culture, our residents, and our faith;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ROY COOPER, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim May, 2020, as "**GOSPEL MUSIC MONTH**" in North Carolina, and commend its observance to all citizens.
