## State Employees and Retirees Benefit Greatly from Cooper Compromise Budget

Republican Conference Budget Shortchanges Most State Employees, Retirees

Governor Cooper's compromise budget:

- Invests \$667 million more for state employee compensation than the Republican Conference Budget
- Includes a \$3.5 billion bond for Education, Water, and Sewer infrastructure improvements statewide
- Restores \$6 million in cuts to key positions at state agencies that protect food, water, and wildlife, and staff our state parks and historic sites
- Provides an additional \$68 million for retiree cost-of-living adjustments

- Salary Adjustment Fund helps recruit hard-to-fill positions and provides market-based adjustments.
- Offers a transparent and open process to find the best place to move the Department of Health and Human Services.
- Delays to the budget **do not** decrease state employee compensation increases as all raises would be retroactive to July 1 (fiscal year start date).
- Under the Republican conference budget only 27% of state workers received the 5% raise that was promised.
