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North Carolina Child Care Snapshot Pre/During/"Post" COVID-19

Prior to COVID-19

- 265,000 children enrolled in regulated child care, 25% receiving subsidy
- 5,746 licensed child care facilities
- 76% centers/255,600 children
- 24% homes/9,900 children
- 41,000 teachers and staff

December 2020

- 126,000 children enrolled in regulated care
- · Open facilities
 - · Centers 93%
 - Homes 97%
- 39,000 teachers and staff

April 2020

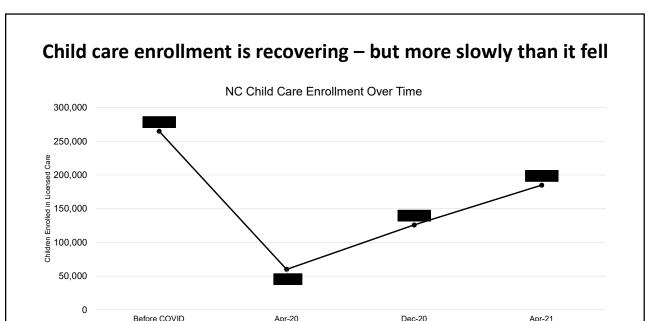
- **60,000** children enrolled in regulated child care
- · Subsidy stabilized + co-pays
- · Open facilities
 - Centers 49%
 - Homes 87%
- 20,000 teachers and staff

April 2021

- 185,000 children enrolled in regulated care
- 70% total pre-pandemic enrollment; 100% pre-pandemic subsidy enrollment
- Open facilities
 - Centers 93%
 - Homes 97%
- 39,000 teachers and staff

Early Childhood 8-Year Plan

- High-Quality Early Learning from Birth | Increase opportunities for high-quality early learning for children at risk, starting from birth
- NC Pre-K | Expand the NC Pre-K program to provide high-quality, full-year services to 75 percent of eligible 4-year-old children
- Early Intervention | Expand the NC Infant-Toddler Program to provide high-quality early intervention services for children with special needs and increase access to services
- Smart Start | Incrementally scale up the Smart Start program to increase quality, access, and support for all children and families, especially in under-resourced communities
- Early Childhood Educators | Increase the volume and quality of the early childhood educator pipeline.
- Elementary Schools | Ensure quality transitions and alignment from early childhood programs to K-3 classrooms and strengthen elementary schools' readiness to support all children to achieve early grade success
- Early Childhood Data | Facilitate reliable access to high quality data supporting early childhood education

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DCDEE took proactive steps to begin *Leandro* work through federal funding from Preschool Development Grant (PDG)

- 2019 Division of Child Development & Early Education awarded \$45 mil
 - Federal funding from HHS, Administration for Children and Families
 - To use over 3 years
 - For strategic investments in NC's early childhood education system
- DCDEE received approval in 2019 to plan and implement six early childhood activities aligned to anticipated *Leandro* areas of focus:
 - Activity 3.1: Family Connects Home Visiting Pilot
 - Activity 4.2: Transition to Kindergarten
 - Activity 5.2: Infant/Toddler Feasibility & Cost Study
 - Activity 5.6: Alternative Market Rate Model Study
 - Activity 6.1: NC Early Childhood Integrated Data System (ECIDS)
 - Activity 6.4: Local Data Informed Strategic Planning

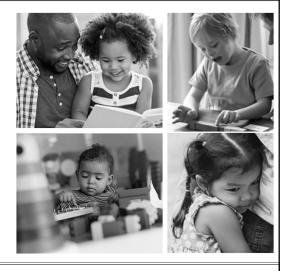
